Smear for Smear Campaign—a special message from Mandy Humphrey

The idea of the campaign is to raise awareness to encourage women to go to their cervical screening appointments.

My Story - I went for my smear test on September 27th this year. I was contacted a few days later for an appointment at Bedford Hospital. On the 3rd Of October I walked into the Consultant's room and from the minute I was there I realised that this was more than just abnormal cells. My first question to the Consultant was 'Do you think I have cancer', to which he replied 'Yes'. Several horrendous tests later along with biopsies and an MRI scan it was confirmed that I have stage 1b cervical cancer. Within a few weeks I underwent a Radical hysterectomy at Adenbrooks hospital, six weeks on and I am currently Cancer free but will be monitored for sometime.

I did not have a smear test for about 7 years. My reminder letters sat on the side, when I did book the tests I cancelled them due to work commitments. I basically used any excuse not to go, because to be honest, they are unpleasant. I worked on the theory that 'It would never happen to me'. Well how wrong could a girl be!!

When I had my meeting with the consultant at Bedford and the specialised cancer nurse Lesley, she told me to stop using Dr Google. She named two sites that would give me honest information, Macmillan and Jo's Trust. I found Jo's Trust particularly helpful with facts, and advice, answering all the questions I needed answering.

I am one of the lucky ones, but I want to shout from the roof tops the importance of going for screening. I want to make sure that ladies do not turn into me putting it off and off. I want to ensure that no one has to go through the difficult conversations, from telling my Dad to telling my 9 year old that mummy has cancer, convincing everyone that everything is going to be ok to make them feel ok about the diagnosis when inside, however many times you say it, there is still that element of doubt. I want to make sure that no-one is pacing the floor at two o'clock in the morning fearing the worse waiting for test results, and I want to make sure the choice of having children is not taken out of women's control by this horrific disease that is preventable just from screening.

The 'Jade Goody' effect has well and truly ended on screening and 1 in 4 women do not attend appointments. Please help me spread the word on the importance of not making the same mistakes I did.


