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Week 2 of lockdown and closure complete—how are you all bearing up? We're still going at school: numbers of children coming in each day remain fairly low, anywhere between 0 and 6 at the moment. Some members of staff are in isolation as a precautionary measure, and Miss Kassim Lowe has been poorly with non-Corona illness, but she's on the mend and is looking after herself.
